The 12th annual "Back to the Bricks" is now history. The celebration began with <u>"Tune-Up Parties"</u> in Flint Township, Clio, Linden, Fenton, Davison, Beecher, and Mt. Morris. Despite extremely hot and humid temps, there were a record number

Main Event Week, August 16th - 20th, began on Tuesday with the traditional "Bricks Flick" at the nostalgic US-23 <u>Drive-In</u> Theater. The featured movie this year was "Bullitt" starring Steve McQueen with some incredible car chase scenes through the



streets of San Francisco. Heavy rain on Tuesday morning proved to be a blessing in disguise, and helped to keep the dust down. Thankfully, the weather cleared in plenty of time, and the grounds were packed with car owners and families who came to enjoy the fun.
